










PACKAGING CONSUMPTION AND PACKAGING WASTE DISPOSAL DECOUPLING FROM ECONOMIC GROWTH*





2014 REVIEW - HIGH-LEVEL TIMELINE (PROVISIONAL)














THE EU WASTE ACQUIS IMPLEMENTATION IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

EUROPEN VIEWS ON TARGETS REVIEW

- The PPWD appropriate and effective legislative framework for driving the recovery/recycling of all packaging waste
- Maintain recovery and recycling targets for packaging waste in the PPWD
- Ensure full implementation and enforcement of the PPWD and WFD in MS
- Harmonise rules for calculating & reporting packaging recycling & recovery rates





EUROPEN VIEWS ON TARGETS REVIEW

- Clarify and harmonise definitions of key terms in both the WFD and the PPWD
- Set targets that are achievable, realistic and take into account different MS performances, capacities and timelines
- Introduce requirements for post-consumer packaging collection in the PPWD
- Additional quantified packaging waste prevention/ reuse targets not appropriate

EPR AS PART OF THE TARGETS REVIEW


Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR)

Policy approach which obliges producers to take some or all responsibility for its products and/or packaging during its life-cycle, including the post-consumer phase

Adopted OECD definition by EUROPEN









EPR AS PART OF THE EU TARGETS REVIEW

- Full/partial financial and operational responsibility for the separate collection, sorting and recycling/recovery of packaging waste
- Transpose legal obligations through EPR compliance schemes
- The obliged industry meets national targets in collaboration with municipalities and Member States



EPR AS PART OF THE EU TARGETS REVIEW Shared responsibility

- Municipalities: financial and operational responsibility for collection, treatment and disposal of municipal waste generated by consumers (in households) and for waste of similar origins
- Waste management companies (including sorting plant operators): develop their service portfolio for separate collection and sorting, work within a contractual frame and follow performance criteria stipulated in a contract.
- Member States: report results to the EU and enforce rules that secure fair competition among economic operators and EPR schemes/PROs.



EPR AS PART OF THE EU TARGETS REVIEW EUROPEN recommendations

- **Introduce in the PPWD:**
 - > An EU harmonised definition for EPR
 - A provision which requires MS to assign roles and responsibilities to public authorities (municipalities), waste management and obliged industry
 - Flexibility for the obliged industry to choose how to comply with its legal obligations
 - Set binding minimum requirements for all EPR schemes (for-profit/not-for-profit) in PPWD (i.e. transparency, scope, consumer info, monitoring, audits)





COMMISSION PROPOSAL ON PLASTIC BAGS

- European Parliament's draft report to amend PPWD to reduce consumption of plastic bags
- Derogation from Article 18 to allow Member States to enact unilateral marketing restrictions, including bans

EUROPEN views:


- Threat to the Internal Market & free movement of packaging and packaged goods
- Would set a far-reaching precedent for all packaging materials and packaged goods
- The PPWD not intended to address chemical-related issues (CMR/endocrine disrupter amendments)
- EUROPEN fosters voluntary agreements and other less burdensome alternatives readily conceivable



EXAMPLE OF INDUSTRY VOLUNTARY INITIATIVE

Global Protocol on Packaging & Sustainability (GPPS)

Packaging supply chain: over 30 years experience in LCA for packaging and packaged products





Beyond legal compliance: EUROPEN Members' sustainability commitments

"Reduce by 25% the amount of material we use across all packaging formats by 2020"

(EUROPEN member, brand owner)

"We have instituted a series of Chairman's awards that recognise Economic, Environmental and Social sustainability performance. Awards have been made in all three regions (Europe, the Americas and Asia Pacific) for resource reductions including materials, energy, water and transport and for increases in recycling and reuse. Selection criteria include transferability and innovation."

(EUROPEN member, packaging manufacturer)



Beyond legal compliance: EUROPEN Members' sustainability commitments

"Halve the disposal waste from our products and reduce the packaging weight by a third by 2020"

(EUROPEN member, brand owner)

"We are also increasing our use of recycled packaging. In 2011, more than one third of packaging was made from recycled materials." (EUROPEN member, brand owner)

"Our goal is to reach an overall 40% recycling worldwide (170 countries) by 2020"

(EUROPEN member, packaging manufacturer)



CONCLUDING REMARKS

The PPWD - of key importance for EUROPEN members:

- \rightarrow guarantees free movement of packaging and packaged products
- \rightarrow increases environmental performance of packaged products

PPWD has been successful in driving recycling/recovery rates and diversion from landfill

Consider some changes in PPWD to adapt to current implementation challenges in MS

EUROPEN sees the review of EU waste management targets as an opportunity to ensure the continued effectiveness of the PPWD in a changed regulatory and market setting to further deliver on the EU Resource Efficiency goals
